
Most respondents spend time on Howard Street in the afternoon.

When it comes to business attraction, keep it casual!


The top three most desired business types for respondents were:

Modes of travel on Howard Street






46% of respondents said **protected bike lanes** would enhance the biking experience on Howard Street.

Nearly half of all respondents named "more active storefronts" as the element that would make the corridor more comfortable



Opportunities between Western and Ridge







One Howard Community Survey Memo Open from April 20 to May 22, 2023

The One Howard project team released a survey about the current life and culture on Howard Street. The survey was open for 33 days and received 521 responses. It was available in English and Spanish. The survey debuted at the public kickoff at Willey B. White Park. The project team was prepared with tablets for people at the event to take the survey, and paper copies were also provided as an option. Everyone who completed the survey was entered into a raffle for one of three \$25 gift cards.

Promotion:

The Survey was promoted through social media pages from the Rogers Park Business Alliance and MUSE Community + Design. The project team also handed out fliers to businesses on Howard Street, added fliers to goodie bags at the Gale Youth Summit, and spread the word through the steering committee members. Alongside an online copy of the survey, project team members visited community organizations and filled out paper surveys with community members.

Meeting Summary

Recent and ongoing community processes and initiatives:

- North of Howard Together is a "super group" of organizations based in Rogers Park north of Howard. The group meets regularly and is planning a cleanup event and a Juneteenth event
- RPBA's Maker Studio is closing in March, there will be a closing event at the end of the month. There is a new tenant for the space.
- Evanston has contracted with Teska Associates to conduct an SSA feasibility study for the north side of Howard, west to Asbury.
- Evanston Thrives Retail Action Plan draft will be published later this month.
- Recommendation to address longstanding concerns and identify visible and early wins for the One Howard Street process. Ensure recommendations are within the control of RPBA, City of Chicago, City of Evanston to execute.
- CTA Red Purple Modernization (RPM) Next Phases Study is taking place. There is a public meeting next week.

Breaking down the corridor into nodes and hubs - observations from committee members:

- The corridor experience is inconsistent. Blocks that are active on the Evanston side are
 less active on the Chicago side, and vice versa. There is not a lot of foot traffic on
 Howard. The street does not lend itself to strolling and shopping people go to a specific
 destination and then move on their way.
- Restaurants on the western end of the corridor are sit-down friendly, while restaurants
 closer to and east of the CTA tracks are more counter service, quick in-and-out. There is
 less landscaping and greenery on the eastern end of the corridor than the western end,
 giving a different view to those are who are dining in a restaurant and looking out the
 window.
- Parking meters and addresses are inconsistent between Chicago and Evanston. This leads to confusion for visitors about which parking app to use, and sometimes causes issues with Uber/Lyft drop-offs.

What's getting in the way of Howard's potential?

- There hasn't been a consistent voice for the corridor. This project and others will help with this issue.
- There is a negative public perception about Howard Street, particularly east of the CTA tracks. There is an idea that people who hang out outside don't belong there. This process should recognize that they are our neighbors as well.

What should we consider when working together?

- Assume positive intent, and approach issues from a solution-focused perspective.
- Use discernment when sharing information outside of this group.

- Keep the goal in mind: this is about both sides of the street, the entire length of the corridor.
- Look for opportunities to include restorative justice principles in the process and plan recommendations.

Meeting Summary:

Updates from committee members:

- The cannabis dispensary and bakery at the new Gateway Evanston development was approved at the zoning, planning, and City Council level.
- The Evanston Thrives plan was adopted at the most recent Evanston City Council meeting. Also approved was \$3M in ARPA funding for implementation and funding for an additional Economic Development staff member for the effort.
- Family Matters was named RPBA's Community Partner of the Year and will be recognized at the Best of Rogers Park event on June 22.
- Family Matters also won a \$250,000 green infrastructure grant from the City of Chicago, putting them one step closer to their goal of complete building electrification.
- CJE has reopened day services for seniors at their facility on Howard Street.

MUSE Community + Design presented an engagement update and shared the Existing Conditions report. Click here to view slides shared with this information.

Responses/Questions to EC Report:

- Some questions about Vote Dry Precincts in Chicago, commentary on the difficulty of reversing them
- Recommendation to put a Divvy station near the entrance to the parking garage; Kyle Ryan (49th Ward) said he'd put in a request
- Re: CTA Parking Garage CTA staff use on-street parking because the garage is not free for them, upsets neighbors because they take up parking spaces.
 - Opportunity to work with CTA on a solution
- Observation that Howard's history has been a series of addressing singular problems in isolation, rather than looking at the corridor as a whole. This is an opportunity to think holistically
- Some questions about affordable housing vis a vie average area rent.
 - Also a note that there is a waiting list for gov't affordable housing, which could be taken into consideration about housing needs
- Recommendation to talk to CMSA for additional youth voice in the process

Event Summary:

One Howard Street Public Workshop Saturday, April 22, 2023 | 10am - 12pm Willye B. White Park, 1610 W. Howard St., Chicago

On a windy and at times precipitous Earth Day morning, the One Howard Street team set up engagement stations around the field at Willye B. White Park. About 50 community members attended and shared their experiences, ideas, and concerns about the Howard Street Corridor. Attendees who completed a digital or paper survey about the project received a One Howard Street branded flower pot with seeds and peat. Coffee and donuts from Sol Cafe were provided to attendees as well.

Engagement Insights:


- People primarily shared experiences and ideas related to the eastern half of the project area, likely because that is where the event took place.
- People would like to see more year-round programming to activate the corridor.
 Ideas included a farmers market, cultural events, and open streets events
- Issues around public safety, loitering, and drug activity were frequently mentioned as top concerns for neighbors
- Mixed feelings about adding affordable/low-income housing to the corridor

- People would like to see **more small businesses**, including restaurants, music store, hardware/home and garden store, sporting goods store




Engagement Insights:

According to HUD, **affordable housing** is defined as housing that **costs no more than 30% of a household's gross income** for housing costs, including utilities.

In 2019, **27% of Rogers Park housing was considered affordable**, less than the City of Chicago average of 36%.

DEFINING AFFORDABILITY

- **Legally Restricted Affordable Housing (LRAH)** refers to housing subsidized by government programs. **Rents for these units are tied to income** as a percentage of Area Median Income (AMI).
- Naturally Occurring Affordable Housing (NOAH) refers to housing that is below market rate but not reliant on government subsidies. The Institute for Housing Studies at DePaul University uses a gross monthly rent of around \$900 per month as a benchmark for NOAH.
- In 2019, about 75% of all affordable housing in Rogers Park was Naturally Occurring.

 Since then, a significant amount of those NOAH were sold and turned over to market rate rents.




